New cancer care research scholarship opens

Ipswich Hospital Foundation (IHF), together with local benefactor Vicki Doig and West Moreton Health, has launched the Vicki and Regina Doig Research Scholarship for Cancer Care. Funding is available for one \$15,000 project or three \$5,000 projects, of up to 12 months' duration, to support West Moreton Health staff to undertake a research project in cancer care.

Please email the team at *WM_Research@health.qld.gov.au* to receive the funding guidelines and application form. Applications close at midday on Monday 27 March, 2023.

The West Moreton Health Research and Innovation team is partnering with the Ipswich Hospital Foundation to create research funding opportunities, including grants and bursaries for WMH staff. This will allow staff to conduct high-quality research projects and learn more about health research.

The provision of funding to support projects makes a huge difference to the capacity of researchers to conduct research and, in turn, can have a major effect on the health and wellbeing of patients in the West Moreton region. The Vicki and Regina Doig Research Scholarship for Cancer Care Research is an example of this type of funding. Books on my nightstand



Why is authorship important?

Have you or your team been asked to be part of a research project? If yes, it's important to ask about authorship during initial discussions about potential involvement in the project. The specific question to ask is: Will you or your team member have the opportunity to be an author on the publications or presentations arising from the study? Being an author on publications has implications for tracking the research activity of the health service and potentially financial implications for the organisations involved. It's also a fantastic experience for you, boosts your CV and provides evidence of research experience if you're interested in exploring research opportunities such as a higher degree (PhD or MPhil) or applying for research funding.



There are criteria for what constitutes authorship. Here is the

information listed on the <u>Queensland Health's Database of Research Activity (DORA)</u>. If you are keen to be an author, it is important to ask the person who approached you to be involved about what you need to do to meet the criteria.

If you are an author, please list West Moreton Health as one of your affiliations.

If authorship is not something you are keen to pursue, it is important to discuss your role in the project and set boundaries regarding your time commitment. Authorship can be a valuable and rewarding experience. For more information or advice, contact the <u>WMH research and innovation team</u>.

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Celebrating innovative women in research for International Women's Day

Professor Fiona Wood is the Director of the Burns Service of Western Australia and is a world leading plastic and reconstructive surgeon and burns specialist. Professor Wood has been a researcher and burns surgeon for more than 30 years. She pioneered the innovative 'spray-on-skin' technique, which significantly reduces permanent scarring for burns victims.



Today, the technique is used worldwide and has saved numerous lives. Spray-on-skin reduces pain, chance of infection, decreases scarring and promotes faster healing. This is an excellent example of innovative research being translated into clinical practice.
